and conservation. The 2016 award recipients selected by the Wright Soil and Water Conservation District are Harlan and Mary Anderson of Cokato, MN.

Harlan Anderson can usually be found on the 1,000 acres of his 1871, 4th generation homestead, "Idle Acres". Located north of Cokato, this farm was the first to be certified under the Minnesota Agriculture Water Quality Program in Wright County. This voluntary program certifies farmers for managing the land within their operation in a way that protects water quality. Harlan wears many hats: farmer, conservationist, entrepreneur, pilot, political figure, veterinarian and writer. Land

stewardship ideals of his father and grandmother, whom firmly believed in agriculture that works with conservation instead of against, shapes the way the Andersons' (Harlan, wife Mary, two sons Mark and Richard) manage their beautifully integrated operation. Insecticide-free, alfalfa, corn, soybeans, wheat rotation hosts

160 bee hives. The no-till fields are fertilized with local liquid manure. Cover crops and inter-seeding provide soil stability. While conservation is not always easy, Harlan advises "You learn what works, what doesn't and always keep learning."
